Subject: Distribution of Recycled Water Within CCWD Service Boundary

Recommendation:

None. Discussion only.

Background:

As the Board has discussed previously, recycled water is a local resource that can play a vital role in making the District's water supply more reliable in the event of a drought or other disruption in local and imported water sources. Implementing a coastside water recycling project will require cooperation among several local agencies, including CCWD, Sewer Authority Mid-Coastside (SAM), and SAM's member agencies (Montara Water and Sanitary District, Granada Sanitary District, City of Half Moon Bay). Recognizing this, the Board at its August 12, 2008 meeting appointed a Water Reclamation Committee for the purpose of initiating discussions with SAM on water reclamation.

The inter-agency agreements necessary for producing and distributing recycled water will be based on the resources each agency brings to the project and on the powers accorded the agencies by law and by their founding documents. In order to better define the basis for CCWD's role in recycling, we retained Patrick Miyaki of Hanson Bridgett to provide a legal analysis. A summary of the analysis, entitled "Distribution of Recycled Water Within CCWD Service Boundary", is attached.

Patrick Miyaki of Hanson Bridgett will discuss CCWD's recycled water authority and answer the Board's questions.

DISTRIBUTION OF RECYCLED WATER WITHIN CCWD SERVICE BOUNDARY

- CCWD has broad statutory authority to do any act necessary to furnish sufficient water within its service boundary, and this includes the authority to treat, distribute, and sell recycled water. Water Code Section 31020.
- SAM is a joint powers authority created by agreement among the City of Half Moon Bay, Granada Sanitary District, and Montara Water and Sanitary District to collect, treat, and dispose of wastewater.
- CCWD and SAM are both interested in the use of recycled water and each has engaged consultants to evaluate the feasibility and cost of providing recycled water within CCWD's service boundary.
- The Water Recycling Act of 1991, commencing with Water Code Section 13575, establishes the relationship between the retail water supplier (CCWD) and recycled water producer (SAM) and provides that the retail water supplier is responsible for supplying recycled water within its service boundary. More specifically, the Water Recycling Act of 1991 provides that:
 - Retail water suppliers and recycled water producers are encouraged to enter into contracts to facilitate the service of recycled water by the retail water supplier in the most efficient and cost-effective manner.
 - Retail water suppliers shall identify potential uses and customers for recycled water with its service area. Recycled water producers may assist the retail water supplier in this effort.
 - A retail water supplier that receives a request from a customer for recycled water shall enter into an agreement to provide recycled water if water is or can be made available to the retail water supplier for sale to the customer.
 - ◆ A customer may not obtain recycled water from a recycled water producer without the agreement of the retail water supplier.
- The Water Recycling in Landscaping Act, commencing with Government Code Section 65601, declares the use of potable water for landscaped areas is waste or unreasonable use of water if recycled water is available.
- The Joint Exercise of Powers Act, commencing with Government Code Section 6500, authorizes two or more public agencies to jointly exercise any powers common to all contracting parties. All of SAM's member agencies do not have the power to supply recycled water without the consent of the retail water supplier. Therefore, this power may not be exercised by SAM.
